This degree in education often includes the following majors: curriculum and instruction, counseling, school psychology, and administration. It is often conferred for educators advancing in their field. Similar degrees (providing qualifications for similar careers) include the Master of Arts in Education (MAEd or M.A.Ed. or M.A.E.) and the Master of Science in Education (M.S.Ed. or MScEd or M.Sc.Ed. or M.S.E.). Typical programs branch into one of several categories: This is typically the area to advance knowledge of, and professional practice in, teaching and learning. Some will use this degree to design instructional technologies, and others will serve as technology facilitators in schools. Candidates in this area would study specific educational issues and often begin educational research in preparation for doctoral work. This is the broadest area of master's work for education. Most states and provinces require a master's-level degree and the certificate that goes with that work to be hired for educational administration (principal, assistant or vice-principal, dean, consultant, etc.) or for licensure as a professional counselor (i.e. caseworker, therapist, community counselor, rehabilitation counselor). For licensure as a professional counselor, one needs a M.Ed., in counseling and an approved internship in which half the time of the internship must be in direct service to the client. The superintendent level in educational administration typically requires doctoral-level work to be completed. Another issue is that most states require continuing course work in order for counselors (especially since new CACREP requirements were implemented) to maintain their licensure. Admission into a master's-level program typically requires a bachelor's degree (BS, BA, or B.Ed.) in education or in the specific field in which the teacher would be teaching, and several years' experience in an educational or mental health setting. There are several ways to abbreviate a master's degree in education. The correct way depends on the exact degree name that was awarded, the awarding institution's preference or the coursework or program structure the student chose. For example, graduates may earn a master's of science or arts in education, or a master's of education. Some degrees are highly specialized, making it as important to list the major with the degree's abbreviation to clarify where a person's expertise really lies. Abbreviate a master's of education degree as M.Ed. if the degree name is specified as a master's of education, not in arts or science first. Specializations with this degree include school counseling, school psychology or educational leadership, which may also be specified in the degree title on the diploma. How long it takes to earn a master's degree varies widely depending on your subject, course of study and the program itself. Most master's degrees take about one to three years to complete. But the degree will take longer to earn if it includes a research or thesis requirement. Degrees that are meant to teach new subjects will take longer than programs that are designed to add to students' existing knowledge. Additionally, some courses of study are much more rigorous than others and require more courses to lead to a particular certification. A Master of Arts in Teaching, for example, usually only takes a year or year and a half, because they are designed to help new teachers complete the requirements to become officially certified to teach the subject of their undergraduate major in their state.
